
## A Chat with a Life Long Animal Lover

Becky Christian-Solvik, animal advocate and SF SPCA donor, shares why she supports the SF SPCA and how she intends to make a difference.



Why did you get involved with the SF SPCA?

An animal lover since birth, I came to San Francisco nearly 20 years ago for grad school, and was drawn to the SF SPCA because it does so much good for the animals of this city I've grown to love so much. By rescuing homeless animals, providing charity veterinary care, and by creating new animal advocates, the SF SPCA is making a real difference—and I wanted to be a part of that.



I will be forever thankful to the SF SPCA for helping to complete my furry family. We already had three boys at home (dogs Homer and Thor and cat Eli) so we weren't necessarily looking to expand our brood. The SF SPCA employs two people from the ARC San Francisco—a lifelong learning and achievement center for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD)—to help run our laundry department.
